Course Materials

You may want to consider purchasing the *Routledge History of Queer America* (ed. Don Romesburg) since we will be reading a number of essays from it and the rest of the volume is very useful for additional course research/context.

Classroom community and language

Because of the nature of the material in the course, some of the readings and images we examine are very frank about the range of human sexuality, and may expose you to ideas or feelings that are outside

your comfort zone. I ask you to be patient with, and open to, these ideas, and also to come and talk to me if there are aspects of the course that are consistently making you feel uncomfortable. A little bit of discomfort is healthy! – but if you continue to feel shut down or confused by the nature of the material, please talk to me about it.

It is also important that you be considerate of the other members of the class in discussing and thinking about issues that may be extremely sensitive to some people. Classes about gender & sexuality at UCLA attract both students who are fulfilling a requirement, as well as students for whom these topics are very important to their personal identity. There is much to learn by combining these different groups in a classroom, but there is also a risk of insult or offense. By taking this class, you commit to working together to build a strong sense of trust and respect in our classrooms.

I would also ask that you be patient with your classmates in this course. The language we use to talk about sexuality and gender is changing all the time, and some of you might be very fluent in that language, and others might be trying to use it for the first time. It's a hard subject to talk about, especially when you feel you might make a language mistake and unintentionally upset someone. I would ask you to help each other, and try to understand the difference between a phobic or intolerant comment and one which is made in good faith, but where the person speaking may still be struggling to get the terminology right. If someone misgenders you, correct them, and try doing it in a respectful and constructive way. If someone points out that you're using terminology that might be considered inappropriate or offensive, listen to what they are saying and try to learn. The ways in which the language around these things are changing can be fun and exciting — we are constantly re-evaluating and creating new ways to understand the wide range of human sexuality and gender experience! I ask you to enter into the class in a spirit of respect, humility, courage, and openness to learn from each other.

Resources such as the <u>HRC Glossary</u> and <u>The Gendercool Project</u> are great ways to educate yourself on changing terminology and growing acceptance & expanding diversity of LGBTQ+ communities.
