Syllabus revised 2025

FUA collaborates with The American University of Florence (AUF), an international university offering US-style undergraduate and graduate degrees, in a cooperation to offer study abroad programs with a diverse breadth and depth of academic curriculum. FUA study abroad programs may include AUF offerings, which are US-aligned in terms of higher education standards as per the university's institutional structure. Common courses offered by FUA and AUF have been jointly selected by both institutions as eligible for mutual recognition and delivery. As such, equal academic standards, credibility, and outcomes are vetted by the Academic Offices of the institutions for all courses and syllabi offered in the study abroad program.

3 Semester Credits. In this foundational open-air painting course, students will explore and familiarize with the pleasures and challenges of painting outdoors. The students will acquire skills in the techniques of Plein Air painting with watercolor pencils and develop critical skills to evaluate paintings executed in this style. This course will also provide students with a look at the various materials and products for outdoor painting using wet techniques. Students will be introduced to the history and tradition of this genre; the “conceptual” in landscape painting will be emphasized with a specific focus on the Italian context. Sessions will be held at different outdoor venues in and around Florence.

The classroom approach of this course is based on experiencing the city of Florence as the academic space for learning and engagement. Classes are not held in a traditional, frontal-style setting; each lesson is carefully mapped for curricular content and featured locations: lectures, observations, exercises, analysis, and reflections on presented topics are held in relevant sites that are accounted for in the academic planning, syllabus, and related course material. Coursework and submissions will be regularly assessed on the MyFUA platform through daily assignments in addition to exams, papers, and projects. Learning through the on-site classroom approach fosters a deeper understanding of the cultural environment of Florence and how it is related to the subject of study represented by the course, and allows the overall experience to contribute to the students' academic and personal enrichment.

**2. OBJECTIVES**

The aim of this course is to provide students with the foundations of outdoor painting, enhancing their capacity to engage with different styles and techniques.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Display understanding and appreciation of basic color, value, and spatial relationships as they apply to outdoor painting.
- Understand and employ techniques, tools, and materials available to the artist for successful outdoor painting.
- Apply foundation drawing skills to support the development of their artwork.
- Expand awareness of the life and work of many different artists, with a particular focus on Italian ‘Macchiaioli’.
- Broaden their painting vocabulary.

**3. REQUIREMENTS**

There are no prerequisites for this course.

#### **4. METHOD**

This course consists of lectures, discussions, and site visits within the local community. Mediums for instruction used will include, but are not limited to, interactive and hands-on activities which challenge thought processes, academic texts and studies, and experiential and/or field learning activities where applicable. As described in point 1, lessons are not held in traditional classroom settings but are based on the city of Florence as the academic space for learning and engagement. ## **9. EXAMS / PROJECTS / ASSIGNMENTS**

The **Midterm Assessment** accounts for 15% of the final course grade. This requires students to complete an en plein air painting. This assignment serves as a direct verification of the students' ability to produce work that reflects their understanding of techniques. Further details will be shared on MyFUA.

The **Final Project** accounts for 30% of the course grade. This project is a Digital Book showing your practices, processes and achievements during the course, and will be evaluated according to how accurate the above criteria are reported. The Digital Book must comprehend your statements, goals and achievements, as well as the procedures and the issues to reach the outcomes. It should include photos of your works, measurements, techniques, and short written statements.

Weekly photographic documentation of your artworks is essential (or steps towards the completion of the artworks), in order to constantly check your improvements, and to have the documentation available for the digital book at the end of the semester.

Please take care when photographic the artwork and in-process progress: create a pleasant setting for the shooting, curate the lighting aspects, enlarge important details, and Photoshop the image if necessary for its legibility.

The **Final Exam** accounts for 25% of the final course grade. The exam will be uploaded and submitted on MyFUA. It will entail short-answer questions and practical exercises. The Final Exam is cumulative.
