

Psychology 303: Forensic Psychology

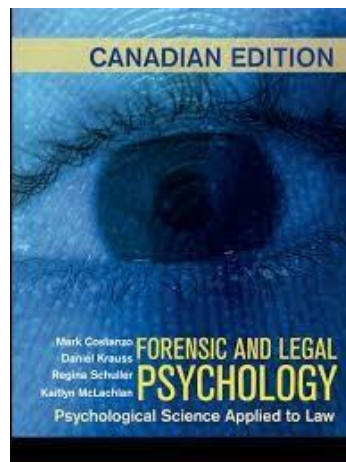

Course Description:

This course will provide students with an overview of core research and practice within the realm of Forensic Psychology. Forensic psychology refers broadly to the research and application of psychological knowledge to the legal system. As this is an introductory course to this area, students will be exposed to a breadth of topics including detecting deception, recovered memories, jury decision making, interrogations and confessions, criminal profiling and eyewitness identification.

Examinations:

Two examinations are scheduled for this course. The dates of the midterms are listed in the course timetable. The final exam will be on the last day of class. Exams will consist of multiple choice, sentence answer and short answer (i.e., a paragraph or two) questions. Emphasis is on integration of the material from lectures (including information presented by guest speakers or from videos), readings and discussions. The exams are **not** cumulative.

Please note: You are expected to take each examination at its regularly scheduled time. The only acceptable excuses for missing an exam are serious illness, family affliction, or University related travel. Each of these excuses must be accompanied by the appropriate documentation (e.g., a note from a physician) to be accepted as a legitimate reason for

absence. You must inform the course instructor **prior to the exam** if you will not be in attendance for any of the aforementioned reasons. If you do not provide a valid reason prior to missing the exam, a score of zero will be assigned.. If a makeup exam is approved, it will cover the same material as the missed exam but the format may differ and the exam questions may be more difficult than the regularly scheduled exam.

(You MUST provide a citation list in APA format showing where you found the information.) If you cannot find the answer to a question put “unknown.” You cannot profile Colonel Russell Williams as I will be discussing him in class.

3. Briefly describe childhood home life (e.g., parents together? Siblings? Adopted? Etc.):	/1

Assignment #2: Podcast/Innocence Project Assignment

Part One-Podcast:

For this assignment you will need to listen to episode 51 of the podcast Criminal. You can access the podcast through your phone podcast app or by going to this webpage:

Once you have listened to the episode, answer the following questions (using your own words, you will receive a zero if you copy and paste from other websites). Please use question and answer format. This is not an essay assignment.

1. Briefly (in half a page) summarize the case described in the podcast. /3
 2. Given what you have learned in class do you believe that Axton's mother qualifies as a psychopath? Explain your answer referring back to the PCL-R. /5
 3. According to a 2017 study over 15 million US consumers had their identity stolen to some degree in 2016 alone. Referring back to your theories of crime knowledge/notes, how would you categorize identification theft (as a crime in general)? Explain your answer. /2

Part Two-Innocence Project:

Go to the Innocence Project website: <https://www.innocenceproject.org/all-cases/#exonerated-by-dna> and pick a case (it can't be anyone we've covered in class). Based on the information provided for that case and your knowledge from this class, answer the following questions (using your own words, you will receive a zero if you copy and paste from the Innocence Project or other websites). You can use additional websites but MUST provide a citation list in APA format showing where you found the information.) Please use question and answer format.

1. Briefly (in half a page) summarize the case you chose (please include the person's name). /2
2. What charges were laid against the accused and what sentence did he/she receive? /1
3. What were the contributing causes of the conviction (innocence project lists these on the righthand side of the page)? /1



4. Given what you learned in class, describe in greater detail how these causes led to the wrongful conviction. (e.g., if there was an eyewitness misidentification go into detail about what likely led to that error given what you learned in class. If there was a false confession, what factors contributed to that confession, etc.) Note: I am not looking for you to just repeat what is on the innocence project website. I'm asking you to take the material you have learned in class and apply it to this case. This is the question where you show off what you have learned. /4

5. Based on this case, what recommendations would you make to police or lawyers to prevent this from happening again? /2
