

# KOREAN110/110G:KoreanforBeginners1 Arts (15 Points)

## **Course Prescription**

Basic written and spoken skills in modern Korean. Through the practice of listening to and reading basic Korean sentences, fundamental grammar and vocabulary are taught so that students will be able to carry out basic conversation and comprehend simple Korean texts.

#### **Course Overview**

This course aims to foster beginners' active learning of basic spoken and written skills in modern Korean, and important aspects of Korean culture related to Korean language. The course is designed for students who have little or no prior knowledge of the language. It is composed of three 2-hour tutorials per week on campus in person, blended with a weekly online learning component that introduces the basic grammar and language features through multimedia materials. By the end of the course, successful students will be able to carry out a conversation on simple topics, to comprehend elementary Korean texts, and to write about their own everyday life at a basic level. The assessment of the course is structured to help students develop four key language skills - listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

#### **Course Requirements**

Restriction: KOREAN 100, 250. May not be taken if a more advanced language acquisition course in this subject has previously been passed

- 4. Carry out conversations on simple topics of daily life (Capability 1.2, 2.2, 4.1 and 4.2)
- 5. Develop a basic understanding of Korean culture related to the Korean language (Capability 1.3, 2.3, 5.2 and 6.1)
- 6. Be able to write about everyday life at a basic level (Capability 1.3, 2.3, 3.2, 4.2 and 5.1)
